n less than three months we will once again be enjoying wonderful displays of color provided by azaleas in our gardens and throughout the Washington area. I wandered around our yard the last two weekends and noticed that, unless we get a late frost that kills buds, this should be a very good year for blooms. I also have been taking care of about 300 rooted cuttings and other small plants that seemed too small to survive the winter outside. The new growth on these plants as the days start to get longer is a sign to me of better things to come in a few months. I am also working to expand one of my azalea beds, by burning old firewood and removing ivy, as the number and size of my azaleas get bigger and the size of the lot stays the same.

This should be a good year for our Northern Virginia Chapter of ASA, based on what is planned so far. Typically, we have four meetings with speakers during the year, plus a cuttings exchange and a plant auction. We also hope to have a tour of member gardens in the spring. This year, the ASA's national convention will be in and around Montgomery County, Maryland from May 12 to 14, with an opportunity for a post-convention tour

Directions to George Mason Branch Library

The George Mason Branch Library is located at **7001 Little River Turnpike (Route 236)** in Annandale, VA. It is in the south side of Little River Turnpike at the intersection of **Hillbrook Dr**. to the south and **Evergreen La**. to the north— between the **Capitol Beltway, I-495**, and the **Shirley Highway, I-395**.

- From the Beltway I-495: go east on Route 236 about 1.70 miles to Hillbrook; the library is on the right at this corner.
- From Shirley Hwy. I-395: go west about 2.75 miles to Hillbrook. Turn left to the library on the corner.
