e will hold our NVASA Chapter meeting on 25 January at the Crowne Plaza Hotel, the very location where we will sponsor the 2009 ASA Convention in May of this year. This will allow us tour the facility and assist us as we finalize our plans.

The speaker for this meeting will be Bob McWhorter, who is currently president of the Potomac valley Chapter of the Rhododendron Society. He is also a member of the Ben Morrison chapter of the Azalea Society. He will present a talk on the Ambrosia Beetle, an emerging threat to azaleas, rhododendrons and other plants.

The goal of the presentation is to educate members about the potential damage this insect can do and what can be done to prevent it from destroying our prize plants. The presentation is based upon Bob's personal experience with the Granulated (Asian) Ambrosia Beetle, which is now pretty much established in Virginia and Maryland; and upon extensive on line research of website postings by all the major Universities and State departments of agriculture and the U.S. DNR Forest Service.

Bob is currently enrolled in a horticulture class at the Community College of Baltimore County in Integrated Pest Management. As the

AAB was covered in the class, he asked the instructor to review and comment on his presentation and the handouts. The instructor gave it an A+ and said it was better than anything he had seen from the University of Maryland Home and Garden Information Center staff. We can be confident that he is presenting current, practical and useful information on this pest, which is particularly fond of deciduous azaleas and many other plants found in ASA/ARS members gardens.

It should be a very useful presentation for all of our members

November 2008 Chapter Meeting

Don Hyatt gave a talk "Propagating Azaleas and Rhododendron", covering both seeds and cuttings. He also gave a brief introduction into some other methods like grafting, layering, and tissue culture. His effort was to distinguish between how one might handle things differently when working with evergreen azaleas, deciduous azaleas, and rhododendrons although most of them are fairly similar.

Considering the time of year this talk was given, Don provided information on how to take dormant root cuttings during the winter, and he also talked about the "The Creel Way", Mike Creel's approach to rooting deciduous azaleas during the winter.

Please remember that this chapter is sponsoring the Azalea Society of America (ASA) National Convention on May 1-3, 2009. The winter issue of the Azalean has been published and mailed to the members. You should have received your copy. You will find the narrative plans for the convention along with the registration form on the inside cover. Sam and Virginia Burd have accepted the job of recording registrations as they come in. Please take a moment and fill out the form, write your check, and get it in the mail. We have set March 15th as the deadline to get your registration fee paid before the penalty of \$15 is added on.

The convention planning committee is continuing to develop the final detailed plans for the conduct of the convention. We have now obtained a contract for two each 57 passenger busses to carry tour visitors.

A recent addition to our convention is the annual Potomac Valley Rhododendron Chapter Flower Show. The show will take place simultaneously with our convention in the hotel. We are still working on the details of how this will take place.

The Convention will open officially at 7:30 PM Friday evening (May 1, 2009). Prior to this, the Board meeting will begin at 2:00 PM. We have revised the registration time. It will begin at 1:00 PM so that the

The Crowne Plaza Hotel is located at 2200 Centreville Road in Herndon, VA. This is on the west side of Centreville Road just north of the Toll Road (VA 267) paralleling the Dulles Access Road.

From I-495 take Exit 45 (VA 267W Toll Road). Exit the Toll Road at Exit 10 (Herndon/Chantilly). Make right of exit onto Centreville Road and the hotel is on the left.

From I-66, Take either the Fairfax County Parkway towards Herndon, or Route 28 towards Dulles Airport to The Toll Road (VA 267).

From the Parkway, go west to the Exit 10 and exit right to the hotel on the left.

From Route 28, take the toll road east to exit 10 and exit left to the hotel on the left.

To avoid paying toll, please refer to maps and/or GPS devices to find other ways to get to Centreville Road in Herndon.
