- 3 phlox stolonifera 'Pink Ridge' @\$3.65--ground-hugging type with 8" flowers in spring, nearly evergreen plant
- 1 Tiarella 'Brandywine' @\$4.15
- 8 Trillum erectum (dormant so viability can't be determined) @\$4.15
- 2 Trillium grandiflorum (dormant, etc.) @\$4.15

November 1, 2009 **Chapter Meeting**

At the meeting on November 1, the chapter hosted Dr. Joe Gutierrez, a long-time member of our chapter and an avid bonsai enthusiast. Joe described some of the history of bonsai, as well as the techniques he uses to achieve the graceful forms so unique to this ancient art. He demonstrated these with azaleas, showing how he prunes the plants and then wires the branches to train them in the desired direction.

He brought seven azaleas, of different varieties, sizes and ages, along with a photo history of each plant to show its shape when he originally got it, and the stages of shaping that resulted in the current appearance. His excellent presentation lured some of his audience to consider trying to create bonsai of their own.

EXCERPTS FROM THE THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION BY PRESIDENT ABRA-HAM LINCOLN

I do, therefore, invite my fellow-citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea, and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a Day of Thanksgiving and Prayer to our beneficent Father, who dwelleth in the Heavens, and I recommend to them, that while offering up the ascriptions justly due to him for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to his tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty hand to heal the wounds of the nation, and to restore it as soon as may be consistent with the divine purpose, to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility, and Union.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed. Done at the City of Washington, this, the 3d day of October, in the year of our Lord, 1863, and of the Independence of the United States, the eighty-eighth.
