## Notes From The Vice President—Rick Bauer

The Executive Committee met on 24 January at Carolyn and Paul Beck's house to approve the schedule and budget for 2010 and to approve a revision of the Chapter By-Laws for presentation to the chapter members for final approval (the latter item is on the agenda for the 11 April meeting). Additionally, we approved the purchase of a liability policy to cover the chapter and our activities for the next year.

We're hoping to embark on a more ambitious program to raise the profile of the chapter in the hopes of bringing in more members, generating more revenue and executing the goals of the national organization and chapter to further promote interest in and exchange of knowledge of azaleas.
