This Northern Virginia
Azalea chapter was
chartered 30 years ago in May 1980
with 12 founding members. Membership in the chapter increased to
37 members by the beginning of
1981. Of those 37 members, there
are still 12 members with the chapter.

What service has the chapter performed for both new and old members over these years? The answer is that the chapter has been a great assistance to both old and new members.

This has been accomplished mainly through education and sharing of experiences. Most members knew little of the vast list of evergreen, deciduous, and native azaleas. Learning about the historical development of azalea hybrids and varieties, and the large numbers of hybridizers and the thousands of varieties that have been developed from the natural varieties is a real education. Every year we learn about taking cuttings, rooting them and growing plants. We have had education in hybridizing azaleas, and some members have taken up this hobby.

Much of this education has been derived from resident experts available within the chapter, but it has also come from sharing of knowledge and experiences by others in hybridizing, starting and growing azaleas, and garden design. The chapter has maintained a speaker program which has brought in outside experts, many on the subjects of azaleas, diseases, insects, and companion plants

Members have had opportunities to expand their collections of plants (some members have gone overboard on this one) through exchanges of cuttings and plants. Through garden tours of other members in the area, they have been able to pick up ideas for design of their own gardens.

The Northern Virginia Chapter has supported and participated in four national Azalea Society conventions in the local area. These national conventions provide great opportunities for camaraderie with azalea growers nation wide.

In summary, this chapter has provided great opportunities for the members to improve their knowledge of azaleas, enter into the field of hybridization, acquire unusual plants, develop gardens, root and grow their own plants, and share their lives and experiences with others going through the same activities

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# Annual Azalea Plant Auction

#### GENERAL

The auction will consist of a live action, a silent auction, and a number of plants at a fixed price per plant. A list of plants that will be available is attached. The doors open at 1:00 PM and the silent auction will begin then. It will end at 2:15 PM, at which time the live auction will begin.

#### SILENT AUCTION GUIDLINES

You will be given a bid number card at the time you register. Your bid number is your identification during <u>both</u> the silent and the live auctions. A list of plants being offered will be provided. This handout will include item descriptions and indicate in which group each plant may be found (silent auction (S), live auction (L) or fixed price (FP).

The silent auction will be open from the beginning of the event until 2:15 pm. There will be an announcement made 5 minutes before the closing of the silent auction.

Each item will be labeled with a code letter and will be accompanied by a bid sheet. A minimum bid and a minimum bid increment will be indicated on the bid sheet. To place a bid, write in your bid in the form's bid column and beside it, in the bid number column, indicate your personal bid number. Please use only your bid number and not your name. We ask that you seek assistance if you find an invalid bid or make a mistake during bidding.

At the time of closing of the silent auction, the highest bidder will be declared the winner on each plant. After the closing, the bid sheets will be collected and the plants distributed to the winners by members of the Azalea Society. Payment in the form of cash or check will be collected by the cashier.

## The Azalea Clipper

T his Northern Virginia Chapter was chartered in 1980 with 37 members. Art Vance was elected president and he put out a newsletter in December 1980.

The Azalea Clipper name was adopted for the next newsletter in February 1981, with Frances as the editor. She did it on an electric typewriter, and mailed out copies with handwritten mail labels on the letters. A copy of this first Clipper is enclosed.

Frances continued publishing the Clipper by typewriter until about 1984 when we got our first computer with a word processor and a data file program. We had to develop a data file of the member's addresses so that we could then print labels for the letters.

It was about 1987 when Microsoft started their Windows Publisher program and we then adopted much the same format as you see today. We were able to import the data file we had into the new database capability. For many years, we had to maintain this membership address list in the Access database program for printing the mailing labels.

Maintaining the membership list by way of the database method is no longer needed. We have abandoned it in favor of the spreadsheet process as maintained by ASA National using the member lists provided by the National Treasurer.

As you can see, Frances is a founding member of the chapter and she has been at this for almost 30 years as Corresponding Secretary, which is a long time. We feel now that getting this letter out has become a burden to us along with the many other requirements we have at our age, along with the large property we have to maintain, so, we must give up this effort as of now. This will be the last Clipper we will publish. We just can't do as much as we used to.

Surely publishing this Clipper offers a great opportunity for someone to exercise his or her ingenuity in making the publication very useful and interesting. The process is well defined; all it takes is the desire and energy to make it go.
