Chapter Members,

June has been another busy month. From an azalea standpoint the highlight was the **Graham County Native Azalea Festival** in Robbinsville, NC as well as the annual Smoky Mountain hikes.

Graham County Azalea Festival

Many of you know that for the last ten years, members of the ASA and the American Rhododendron Society (ARS), along with others, have participated in efforts to restore the native azaleas on **Hooper Bald** in the Nantahala National forest of North Carolina. These efforts included removing competitive species and planting native azaleas on the Bald. **Jim Brant** from the Vaseyi Chapter and **George McLellan** from the Northern Virginia Chapter were the personnel coordinating the efforts of countless volunteers (as well as putting in a lot of sweat equity themselves). **Jim Brant** was recognized by the U.S. Forest Service last year when he was presented with an award in the Restored & Resilient Landscapes category for spearheading the effort.

Several ASA members were present for the festival and other events. Besides **Susan** and myself we were joined by ASA Vice President **Charlie Andrews**, ASA Past President **Buddy Lee** and his wife **Dixie**, ASA Past President (and current Vaseyi Chapter president) **J Jackson** and his wife **Lindy Johnson**, Vaseyi members **Jim** and **Pam Brant** and **Joe** and **Jan Nicholson** (also President of the Azalea Chapter of the ARS), Ben Morrison Chapter member **Joe Miller** and his friend **Halit Kardak** and Northern Virginia Chapter Members **Don Hyatt** and **George McLellan**.

Thursday evening several us got together for dinner at the Tapoco Lodge, a historic site named for the **Ta**llahassee **Po**wer **Co**mpany which

built the nearby Cheoah dam. It is a beautiful site along the Cheoah River.

Friday was focused on **Hooper Bald** with tours of the bald provided by society members and volunteers from the **Partners of Joyce Kilmer-Slickrock Wilderness** who also worked hard to improve the trail leading to the bald.

Friday evening a reception was held at the Stecoah Valley Center a wonderful facility housed in the former Stecoah Union School which was opened in 1926. Food and drink were plentiful, and this was followed by an award ceremony. The Azalea Society of America presented the town of Robbinsville, NC/Graham County with the Azalea City Award in recognition of their efforts to promote azaleas. ASA Distinguished Service Awards were given to Jim Brant, George McLellan and J Jackson

and Lindy Johnson for their work in promoting azaleas and supporting the ASA.

Saturday was the festival held near the Graham County Courthouse. There were a number of vendors with different types of food, plants and other items to sell. The ASA also manned a membership booth. The azaleas were very popular items and sold out early. I'm sure they'll have a bigger supply next year.

I hope this was the first of many festivals. I'm excited about some of the ideas put forth to beautify the town of Robbinsville with azaleas in addition to maintaining Hooper Bald. Smoky Mountain Hikes

Each year **Don Hyatt** and **George McLellan** put together a series of hikes in the **Smoky**

Mountains to view native azaleas and rhododendron. I have participated in portions of these hikes over the past several years. This year due to other commitments, my participation was limited to visiting Wayah Bald and Wine Spring Bald.

Wayah is still recovering from a massive fire in the fall of 2016 which destroyed some major azalea, rhododendron and mountain laurel plants. The good news is that we were able to see evidence of plant recovery.

Wine Spring Bald didn't suffer any of the effects of the fire directly, though I was told that some large specimens had been

cut down near the communication towers at the top to lessen the threat of fires near the towers. While there were impressive stands of calendulaceum, what impressed me most were the huge mountain laurel.

Cutting Exchange – 15 July 1-5 pm Kirkwood Presbyterian Church

One of the best things about being a member of the society is the ability to share plants and cuttings with other members. The annual cutting exchange is our prime opportunity for this sharing. If you haven't tried propagating in the past, I encourage you to give it a shot. I have added a large number of azalea varieties, especially those developed by chapter hybridizers, to my garden through propagating cuttings.
